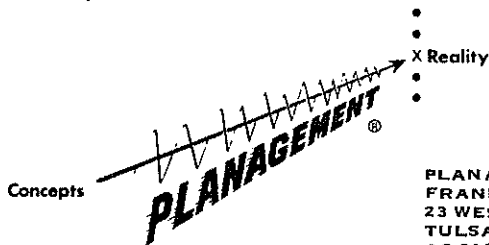

## Log of the S. S. Fellowship

It was another very successful reunion we had in Williamsburg because Sumpter Priddy Chairman and Hugh McKenna and Dick Taylor Co-chairmen, and all who participated, made it so. We owe them a debt of gratitude and all of us who attended gave them our thanks.

Friday evening one after another came, registered, went to the Hospitality Suite where everyone welcomed each mate that came in the door and it was soon buzzing with conversation. The Virginia Delegation was host and they did a grand job.

Saturday morning started with coffee and danish rolls and at 9:30 Parke Rouse, Historian, gave an excellent talk on the history of the area and we learned much of the early years of our country. Then Frank Ziebell, President of U. S. Jaycees, gave a most interesting report on how our beloved organization is and has done since our last reunion. Then Carroll Bouchard, Secy-General of Jaycees International, made us feel proud of the way the Jaycee idea has spread around the world. Both Frank and Carroll paid tribute to us old-timers for the way we prepared for the present day successes.

Then Chuck Shearer who was President of the U. S. Jaycees 20 years ago, reminisced about that year and the years that followed and with his Washington observation gave us an insight as to Governmental affairs now. Then I gave the list of mates who departed this life since last reunion and we honored them by speech and a moment of silence.

Being noon time we adjourned and most of the mates spent the afternoon visiting all the places of historical interest, in Williamsburg, in Jamestown, in Yorktown and the whole area.

We resumed at 6:45 for a delightful reception on the outdoor terrace - a wonderful social hour before the dinner.

At the dinner Charlotte Mungenast was presented with a beautifully done resolution signed by all the Trustees of the War Memorial Fund and I was presented with a silver candelabra and then John O. Marsh former Congressman from Virginia and former Special Assistant to President Ford was presented with the Brownfield Alumnus Award which is awarded annually to a distinguished alumnus.

Then our mate Harry Stewart regaled us with laughter in his special brand of humor that kept us all "in stitches". It was a delightful ending of a joyous evening and those who wished to dance did their steps at the Ft. Magruder Lounge, and others went to the hospitality room until it closed.

Sunday morning we all gathered for the Worship Service - and it really was that. So many of the mates participated all in their own way carrying out the first tenet of our Jaycee Creed that "we believe that faith in God gives meaning and purpose to human life" - and how inspiring it was to hear each one tell what faith in God has meant to them and the blessings they have had.

Then John Marsh told of his experience in the transition of power at the time President Nixon resigned and turned the reins over to President Ford. Marsh had a great part to play in the orderly transfer of power and his story gave us all a deep appreciation of the American government system. We all gave him a standing ovation which was well deserved.

There were a few closing remarks and the reunion was over but many lingered on for some hours in bidding fond farewells.

Besides this brief resume of the fine reunion, the purpose of this special issue of the "Log" is to call your attention to the enclosed brochure about the Jaycee Archives project which the Crew adopted for a project they think is so vital to the history of the Jaycee movement which binds us all together. 
Everyone at the Reunion was inspired and I hope you as a Crew member will be inspired, too, and I shall be waiting to hear of your dedication to this great project.


